COC Certificate Award

The COC would like to give recognition to those who have made outstanding contributions at the national and regional levels to orchid culture, education and service. This year COC certificates will be awarded at the AGM, but we need your nominations.

The proposals should be no more than one page in length and should indicate

- The name of the Candidate
- The category being honoured
- Justification why the candidate deserves the honour (not to exceed 500 words)
- national service
- research excellence
- conservation contributions etc
- Who supports the nomination.

Criteria: To be awarded to individuals or groups for one or more of the following:

- 1. Outstanding service to the Canadian Orchid community in organization, promotion or leadership.
- 2. Outstanding achievement in orchid research, hybridizing, culture or conservation.

Number per year: No limit, based on merit.

Selection Process: Well supported proposals by member society(s), or individuals. The COC President may wish to establish a committee to research and propose candidates, but this should not preclude others to make submissions.

Approval process: By majority vote of the COC Executive to be ratified at the annual meeting.

The extended deadline for submissions will be September 15 to the secretary, Carol Girt.

From the President

I have just returned from the very successful and entertaining SOOS Summerfest held at the Toronto Botanic Gardens. This event is always well attended and again The SOOS outdid itself, thanks to the hard work of Yvonne Schreiber, SOOS president, program chair Mario Ferussi and the fantastic cooks and suppliers of a delectable and amazing luncheon that has become a most appreciated feast every year. Fred Clark of Sunset Valley Orchids presented fascinating talks on today's mini and compact cattleyas and on new hybrids of Catasetum, Cycnoches and Mormodes.

This is the last editorial from the current Board and myself. We want to thank all societies, society presidents and COC representatives for your support over the last two years. We could not have finalized the various initiatives undertaken without your agreement and help. As of the September AGM, there will be a number of changes in the executive, and as of this writing, if you are interested in serving on the Board there are several positions for which we do not as yet have candidates, these include a vice presidents and the secretary. If you are interested in serving on the COC, please let Past President Faithe Prodanuk know as she is in charge of putting the nomination slate together.

We have made a number of changes over the last two years that have strengthened the COC: the insurance program has become almost 100% cost recoverable and our fees dropped yet again this year due to Lynne Cassidy's great negotiation skills. Now after many years at the helm, Lynne has decided it's time to pass the torch and Dianne Gillis, also of the Fraser Valley Orchid Society has agreed to take on the challenge. Thank you Dianne and thank you Lynne for your wonderful leadership to this very important program. A number of programs have been finalized and made operational including the educational grant program which was well subscribed in its first year, the AGM Subsidy for the hosting society, revamped web site and updated newsletter, the culture sheets program is being expanded and culture sheets are now also available in French for use by the francophone societies. Many societies have requested the slide programs on disc and updating continues. Work on the very frustrating import and CITES guidelines (for Singapore WOC) continues and should be in place by the beginning of 2011, almost a year ahead of the Congress. As well CFIA is continuing to review their plant import guidelines for houseplants (including orchids) and we are continuing to work (albeit slowly) with them to try and ensure the orchid import requirements are reasonable and appropriate to actual practices.

On the administrative side, policies and procedures have been filed and kept up to date by the secretary (a very big job, thank you Carol). The annual incorporation filing is up to date. Jerry Bolce has spent hours getting the archives organized and up to date so that there is a permanent electronic record of our history and major accomplishments. Thank you Jerry, you are the cornerstone which keeps us all together and functioning. The COC budget has been balanced and we are in a good financial position for the foreseeable future, without requiring further increases in insurance fees. The appointment of a membership liaison chair has provided an additional interface for societies with the COC. Also on a positive note, is the addition of three new societies to the COC family: The PEI Orchid Club, the Richmond (BC) Orchid Club and the Essex County Orchid Society (Ont.). Worrisome however, if the continuing decline in membership in some of the larger societies and this needs to be addressed.

This year COC certificates will be awarded at the AGM, given to honour those who have made outstanding contributions at the national and regional levels to orchid culture, education and service. In this newsletter Jerry will provide a link to the COC award criteria and the application form. Please consider nominating someone from your area. The extended deadline for submissions will be September 15 to the secretary, Carol Girt.

We are on target to mail the AGM package in August. Please note that the two major decisions required this year from Societies are your nominations for the COC certificate and approval /comments on the Amendments to the Bylaws which will be tabled for approval at the AGM.

The Central Ontario Orchid Society (COOS) has put a lot of time and effort into organizing an interesting Show, exciting vendors and speakers around the COC meeting. In particular, thanks to the hard work of Frank Maine, COOS Show Chair, to get import permits so that CITES 1 and 2 orchids, particularly paphs and phrags, will be on sale at the Show. This is a great opportunity to pick up some of these award winning plants. Do mark the September 25-26 date on your calendars. We hope to see you there. Also COOS would appreciate a contribution from each society for the COC auction which will be held during the show. The auction is held to provide COC with additional funds and is our only fund raiser during the year. As well half the auction proceeds go to the hosting society to help offset their costs in holding the meeting. Please be generous in you support.

Finally my thanks to the Board for their hard work, thanks to all Societies for your support, it has been a tremendous pleasure working with you.

Le petit manuel de Laurier

En souvenir de Laurier Nappert qui nous a quitté

Je devais avoir environ 18 ans. Lasse des mes échecs répétitifs avec les orchidées, j'achetais alors, pour la modique somme de 5,95 \$, le « Petit manuel d'introduction aux orchidées ». Un mince livret de couleur crème, simple, bien conçu, bourré de données, mais sans aucune photographie. Les thématiques abordées étaient très nombreuses et variées : principes généraux de culture, achat des plantes, comment monter une collection, culture du Paphiopedilum, culture du Phalaenopsis, classification, nomenclature, prononciation des noms scientifiques, comment lire un catalogue, insectes et maladies, empotage, livres et périodiques, hybridation, marchands, etc. L'auteur avait même cru bon d'inclure une section dans laquelle il détaillait les étapes à suivre pour l'importation de végétaux. Pas mal, pour un manuel qui se voulait d'introduction ! Un travail de synthèse colossal.

Son auteur s'appelait Laurier Nappert. J'ai lu et relu je ne sais combien de fois certaines sections. Équipée de cet outil, je pouvais maintenant entreprendre plus sérieusement la culture des orchidées.

À l'époque, Laurier produisait des orchidées chez lui, dans sa maison dans la région de Québec. J'ai passé chez Orchibec ma première commande postale, avec mes maigres économies d'étudiante. Un jour, je me rendis à son domicile pour choisir mes bébés. J'y fut accueillie par un homme posé, méticuleux et un peu timide. Par une maladresse qui lui ressemble si peu, il laissa tomber au sol un semis de *Paphiopedilum* Houghtoniae. Il remit délicatement le substrat dans le pot, me tendit l'orchidée, en disant : « Ses racines ne sont pas dérangées, c'est sûr qu'il va pousser si tu lui donnes de bons soins. C'est le meilleur plant». J'ai hésité quelques secondes. Puis j'ai compris que je devais prendre cette plante, car cet homme, de toute évidence, savait de quoi il parlait.

J'allais, bien entendu, suivre les conseils prodigués dans le « Petit manuel », car après tout, c'était le premier bébé *Pa-phiopedilum* dont j'avais la responsabilité ! J'allais parvenir à le faire pousser et réussir à le faire fleurir, mais seulement 7 ou 8 ans plus tard. Ce qui est tout à fait normal pour ce grex, me rassura-t-on.

Laurier ferma Orchibec peu de temps après cette visite, une lourde couverture de neige ayant eu raison de sa serre. Ce n'est que plus récemment, soit 20 ans plus tard, que nos routes se sont à nouveau croisées, quoique brièvement, mais sur un mode plus personnel. J'ai découvert quelqu'un de profondément sensible et attentionné envers les autres. Et il était tout aussi passionné d'horticulture qu'autrefois, bien qu'il réservait son cœur d'hybrideur aux plantes vivaces comme les iris, hémérocalles et échinacées de même qu'à sa plus récente passion, les amaryllis.

À l'automne 2009, nos états de santé respectifs chancelaient, ce qui, curieusement consolida notre amitié. Les passionnés d'horticulture, à l'instar de tous les passionnés, se retrouvent démunis lorsque la maladie vient freiner l'épanouissement de leur passion. Or, il est plus facile d'exprimer ce que l'on ressent avec quelqu'un qui traverse une épreuve similaire.

Malheureusement, au fil des jours, sa maladie allait se révéler impitoyable, alors que la mienne passa simplement son chemin. En dépit de son état qui déclinait gravement, Laurier, en homme généreux et attentionné qu'il était, n'oubliait pas de prendre régulièrement de mes nouvelles.

Il y a quelques jours, j'ai ressorti avec tristesse le petit manuel, que j'avais mis de côté très longtemps, égaré qu'il était parmi les livres les plus clinquants de la bibliothèque. Avec nostalgie, je l'ai lu à nouveau, pour la énième fois. Je suis encore étonnée de la haute qualité de son contenu et de la richesse de l'information qu'il recèle. Ses 42 pages offrent plus de renseignements pertinents que nombre de bouquins plus volumineux. Mais pouvait-il en être autrement ? Laurier Nappert n'était pas n'importe qui. Il devait toujours aller au fonds des choses et il aimait profondément partager ses passions.

Malheureusement, ce grand homme de l'horticulture n'aura plus la possibilité de transmettre ses passions aux autres, puisqu'il est décédé au printemps dernier.

J'ai une pensée pour lui à chaque fois que je prends soin du *Paphiopedilum* Houghtoniae. C'est le seul plant qui provient de sa production que j'ai encore dans ma collection. J'y tiens comme à la prunelle de mes yeux.

Bien sûr, le petit manuel occupe maintenant une bien meilleure place dans la bibliothèque.

Laurier, tu manqueras à beaucoup d'entre nous.

Laurier Nappert avait deux grandes passions: l'horticulture et la musique.

Il avait reçu une formation musicale en 2004. Il a dirigé une chorale pour laquelle il réalisait la plupart des arrangements. La composition l'attirait particulièrement. Certaines de ses pièces sont utilisées un peu partout dans le monde.

Autodidacte dans le domaine de l'horticulture, il a créé plusieurs hybrides d'orchidées. Il a été le premier québécois et le dixième canadien à enregistrer un hybride d'orchidée auprès des autorités internationales. Il a été un des membres fondateurs de la Société d'Orchidophilie de la Région de Québec, maintenant connue sous le nom de "Les orchidophiles de Québec". Durant les dernière années de sa vie, il s'est consacré principales aux vivaces comme les échinacées, les hémérocalles ou les iris de même qu'aux amaryllis. En 2009, c'est avec fierté qu'il réussit à faire fleurir un amaryllis issu de ses croisements en moins de un an, exploit qu'aucun hybrideur d'amaryllis au monde n'avait réussi à ce jour.

Il est décédé en mai 2010, à l'âge de 63 ans.

COS Award

"The CVIOS was awarded the COC show medal. Their display was several long tables arranged in a zig-zag pattern, draped in black; the plants were placed on tall, slender boxes painted black, of different heights with very few plants standing on the tables; the boxes were surrounded at the base with pine- and cedar boughs. The gentlemen arranging this exhibit made excellent use of "empty" spaces, which allowed the orchids to show their full beauty, at suitable heights."

Since she initially joined the Society, Ruth has served as Newsletter editor and has assisted in the process of revising the Society's Constitution on two separate occasions. She remains a faithful defender of the Society's original articles of incorporation along with its aims and objectives.

Ruth is acknowledged by the members as a fine grower of orchids, having a greenhouse that she and Ron built onto their Wheatley, Ontario home many years ago. In his introduction during the presentation, Society Newsletter co-editor, Chuck Lefaive, said, "I am honoured by our Executive's request that I perform these most pleasurable functions – that of acknowledging Ruth's important contributions over the years to this Orchid Society, recognizing her as the very fine and sensible person she is, and underlining how refined a grower of orchids Ruth has been, seemingly always well-attuned to her plants' requirements for good growth and flowering."

Before being presented with the award trophy by the Chairman, Ed Cott, Ruth was asked to recite a poem entitled, "Orchidacea" from her first book Haphazard garden (1999). Afterward, humble as she is, Ruth thanked the members for the award and acknowledged the joy that orchids and her membership to the Society have given.


