President's Ramblings

Our 2013 Annual General Meeting is coming up fast. It will be hosted by the Manitoba Orchid Society in Winnipeg in conjunction with their annual show and sale at the Assiniboine Park Conservatory March 22, 23, and 24. Set up and Judging is on Friday, there is a banquet and auction Saturday night, and public sales and viewing are Saturday and Sunday. Auction items are requested and those that are donated in the name of the COC will be auctioned on behalf of COC. We will have our AGM on Sunday starting at noon local time at the offices of the Living Prairie Museum. This will allow us to attempt our first internet connected meeting. We hope to use "go to meeting" to allow those delegates who cannot attend physically to connect and have input. You will need a computer internet connection to participate. There will be further directions, but please let me know if you wish to participate in this fashion. Alternatively and to make sure we have a quorum, please send me your proxies on the agenda items. If your society plans to have a representative in person at the meeting please let me know that also as soon as possible.

At this time we have two invitations for our 2014 AGM. So we will need a discussion and decision in Winnipeg on which one to accept. One is from the Orchid Society of Minnesota to join them at the AOS and MAOC meetings that they are hosting April 30 to May 4, 2014 in Bloomington, Minnesota. The other is from the Southern Ontario Orchid Society to join them at their Orchidfest in Toronto August 9-10, 2014. I, of course am biased in favour of the Canadian location.

Julie St. Pierre is the Program Chair of the Essex County Orchid Society. She emailed me recently with the following suggestion that I think has a lot of merit: "It would be great if each Society could provide a list of speakers that they get during the year and/or a list of people or names of their members that would be willing to speak to nearby Societies. There is lots of knowledge out there that we need to capture". I think sharing program speakers and ideas would be very useful, especially within regions. Any suggestions as to how this might be best implemented? Looks like a good job for a new vice president. [*Also look on the COC website for the current COC speaker list.*]

The spring show season has started. I have seen good public attendance in Edmonton, Toronto and Burlington. There are people out there that are hungry for orchids and orchid knowledge. It is up to us to engage them.

In Toronto we have been trying out a for us new show activity. We have long had a very popular Sunday morning time for photographers. This has become so popular that participating photographers complain about it being too crowded and not long enough. Two years ago and again this year a photography club approached us about opening the show to them exclusively for a set fee on Saturday night. They controlled the number of participants and collected the entry fee for us. This turned out to be beneficial to the photographers as well as the show. The show got a set fee for minimal supervision of an orderly photo session at a time that would normally not be worth opening to the general public anyway. A win-win for everyone. Now we need to work out how to better deal with our open overcrowded Sunday morning photographers session.

Hope to see many of you in Winnipeg later this month.

2012 Financial Results

The COC just completed another successful year and the results are as follows:

For the year ended December 31, 2011, the COC recorded a surplus of \$329. Revenues were up by less than 8% while the expenses were down by about 11%; these variations are the result of the Annual General Assembly. With the \$1,000 donation from the Orchid Society of Alberta, the COC made a grant to the Orchid Species Preservation Foundation of the same amount. One expenditure that may require special attention is the amount paid for legal fees which totalled more than \$826. The COC collected \$3,062 for insurance for the societies and the insurance premium was \$3,005; it appears that no fee increase is required for the 2014 year.

The report will be tabled at the next Annual General Assembly for approval.

My musings on the Pacific NW Judging Center

So what exactly happens at an AOS judging Center?

Many years ago, the AOS Pacific NW Judging Center was established by some devoted afficionados. This was a real bonus for devoted orchid growers, as no AOS nominations for orchids could occur without the presence of accredited AOS judges. The presence of judges was largely confined to the various AOS accredited shows in the region and if your beautiful orchid flowered outside of those sanctioned times, you had no way of getting an opinion on the merits of your plant.

Now, every 2nd Saturday of the month, AOS judges, and student judges, assemble at the Sea Island Community Center to look at the orchids brought in by orchid growers. When I went on Saturday February 11(my first visit), there were about 28 orchids submitted for examination by the judges; ownership of the plants must not be known to the judges, as the latter must remain impartial. Everyone dropped off their orchids in a discreet manner. Several orchids were chosen for closer examination ('nomination'). When the judges took a closer look, they not only examined this particular plant, but they compared it to

similar or identical plants that had received awards in the past. Thanks to the digital age, this information was at the fingertips of the judges.

After the initial discussion about the plant in question, the first decision that had to be made was whether the judges felt that this particular plants warranted a formal evaluation ('scored'). Once that decision had been made, each judge was given a rating sheet which covered flower form, color of flower, and other characteristics. Within each category there were further subdivisions, each with its own set of points. The maximum number of points tallied across the 3 categories was 100. A score of 75-79 points gets the HCC (Highly Commended Certificate), 80-89 points gets an AM (Award of Merit), and 90 points plus gets an FCC (First Class Certificate).

As a visitor, you could wander between the judging teams that were examining potential nominations, or be invited to stay with one team. You may not express an opinion on an orchid unless invited to do so; you may certainly not identify an orchid as belonging to a certain individual, again for reasons of anonymity / impartiality. One team was examining an unusual catasetum, which was very special. It was very clear to me that the judges needed a great deal of knowledge to navigate the whole judging process, and that they needed a lot of experience with many, many plants to make any sound judgement. It was not surprising to learn that the whole process of becoming an accredited judge takes a minimum of 6 years, with 3-5 years as a student judge, and 3 years as a probationary judge. Becoming an AOS judge is a volunteer, non funded, training which takes a lot of dedication.

In Memoriam: Dr. Wally Thomas

Dr. Wally Thomas passed away after a severe illness on January 15th. 2013. He had many friends and admirers all over the world. He was an internationally acclaimed breeder of odontoglossums and together with Dr. Carl Withner, was a founder of the Canadian Orchid Congress. Dr. Wally Thomas signed in as a guest of the Vancouver Orchid Society ("VOS") in April, 1958 and became Vice President in 1960. He had been President of the VOS several times and was a co-chair of the 16th World Orchid Conference which was held in Vancouver in 1999. He was instrumental in bringing the WOC to Vancouver after 12 years of planning. Wally was also one of the four founding

members of the Odontoglossum Alliance and it is still

going strong. The first meeting was held in Vancouver and



is now an international organization. Wally had purchased two plants in 1958. They did not last very long but the interest in orchids had been sparked. It was not long till he built his first greenhouse, bringing up rocks for the foundation from the beach. Soon that was full and another greenhouse was built, then another and another and then the porch was enclosed to house some more.

Wally's favourite orchids were the Odontoglossums, in particular the red and white crispum. His kindliness to all who knew him and his wealth of orchid knowledge will be greatly missed. Our condolences go to his wife Shirley and their family.
